

LOS ANGELES JEWISH HOME FACT SHEET

- The Los Angeles Home opened in 1912 in Boyle Heights and has served the community for 100 years.
- The Jewish Home is the largest single-source provider of senior care in Los Angeles.
- The Jewish Home provides a full continuum of care for almost 1,000 seniors in residence. Another 1,300 seniors are served through the Home's community-based programs, which include Skirball Hospice and palliative care, short-term rehabilitative care, and acute geriatric psychiatry care, in addition to annual cross-over.
- The Jewish Home's two campuses covering 16 acres, Eisenberg Village and Grancell Village, are located in Reseda in the west San Fernando Valley.
- The Jewish Home has two full-service, state-of-the-art medical clinics run by a team of on-staff physicians, nurse practitioners, and rehabilitation therapists.
- Numerous amenities are offered to ensure an active, secure lifestyle in a warm, Jewish environment, encompassing a holistic approach to healthy aging that cares for the body, mind, and spirit.
- Jewish Home provides social services and mental health counseling for residents and their families, and physical, occupational, speech and language therapy programs.
- Skirball Hospice, a program of the Jewish Home, provides end of life and palliative care to adults in the Greater Los Angeles area.
- A staff of more than 1,100 oversees the delivery of quality care and programs for all services, in-residence or in the community.
- Staff retention is among the highest in the state. More than 100 employees have now been with the Jewish Home for over 20 years.
- The Jewish Home offers many opportunities for professional growth, and is committed to its employees' career development. The Home's training programs include instruction as a restorative nursing assistant (RNA), certified nursing assistant (CNA), and continue through preparation for the licensed vocational nurse (LVN) examination at the Home's Annenberg School of Nursing.
- The majority of our residents rely upon government entitlement benefits, which subsidize only a part of their costs of care. Donations to support the Home's exceptional care are received from individuals, charitable foundations, and corporate giving.
- About 13% of the Home's annual operating budget is dependent upon individual and business contributions, planned gifts, and foundation grants.
